Where the Pass Meets the Present From the Canary Islands to the Mississippi Gulf Coast A family tale by Ike Edwards - President

The saga of the American family and their collective experiences has largely become one of those uncertainties. In documenting a family history, hours upon hours of dutiful research are required to uncovering "truth." Once a "truth" has been uncovered, the researcher must be careful to understand nuance, culture, and context of each shred of evidentiary material.

Domingo Fleitas (4th great grandfather) was born in 1750 in the Canary Islands, son of Juan Fleitas and Juana de Vera, in Santa Cruz de Tenerife. He died in New Orleans in April 1819. He was a Medical Doctor who served in the Galvez expedition against Manchac and Baton Rouge in 1779. He was medic-in chief of the Royal Hospital (which became Charity Hospital in New Orleans in 1783).

On the 4th of April, in the 74th year of his age, Mr. Berthe Grima, merchant, was an old inhabitant of this city. Finding himself indisposed in the middle of the night, he sent for Dr. Domingo Fleitas, who in two minutes, after feeling the pulse of his friend, fell down, and they both expired at the same instant. A neighbor coming in soon afterwards fainted away, either from the shock of such a spectacle, or some other unknown cause, but recovered in a little time. (New Orleans, paper).

Domingo was married to Marie Joseph Guesnard, who died in 1834. Their four children were: Juan Manuel (died 1873), Francis Barthelemy (died 1858), Pauline Joseph (died 1852) and Virginia Constance.

Francis Barthelemy married Marie Modeste Doretha Cucullu. Their children were Francis Barthelemy Fleitas, Jr., Marie Rose Fleitas, Angelina Fleitas, John Dominique Fleitas, Jackson Emmanuel Fleitas, Louise Augusta Fleitas, William Fleitas and Louis Fleitas.

Pass Christian's War Memorial Park site was originally sold in 1834 for \$1,000 to Modeste de St. Germain, widow of Simon Cucullu, Sr. by Charles Asmar, a free man of color, who originally owned most of downtown Pass Christian. The deed appears in the courthouse at Gulfport, Book 8, pages 389,390.

The daughter of Madam Cucullu, Marie Modest Dorothy Cucullu married Francis Barthelemy Fleitas, Sr., from whom the name of Fleitas avenue was derived. For 58 years the War Memorial Park property was to remain in the hands of the Cucullu-Fleitas family. Francis Barthelemy Fleitas, Sr died on January 9, 1858, at the age of 71. His widow, Marie Modeste Dorothy Cuculla-Fleitas, lived to be of great age, finally passing away on Dec 10, 1898.

Additional notes regarding Ike Edwards family:

Juan Manual Fleitas, (1794-1873),the brother of Barthelemy, (3rd great grandfather) had a child with Marie de la Concepcion Eyssalenne a native of Cuba and a resident of New Orleans. (source: Baptism record).

Bruce Stinson spoke at our July luncheon on "Nineteenth Century Pass Christian," as revealed through pre-1900 newspaper accounts.

While the broad outline of our history is well known -- the colonial land grants, the arrival of the Americans, the antebellum resort, the "Battle" of Pass Christian, -- newspaper accounts add a lot of texture.

In August, Dan Ellis led a group of people along the route of the Old Spanish trail. The Pass Christian Historical Society hosted the travelers who were reinacting an event that took place over a hundred years ago.



At our August luncheon, Richard Ward and Sally James gave an interesting first hand account of the unique history of the Old Town Library..

Dr. Adam Rydbeck who lives in our community and also works as an



oceanographer with the Naval Research Lab at Stennis Space

Center spoke at our September Member meeting. The subject for his talk was "Tropical Thunderstorms in

Our Backyard and Across the Globe".

At the September luncheon, Vincent Scott, a retired US Navy cryptologist. spoke about Cryptologic History - US military signal intelligence operations in the 20th Century.



At our October Membership Meet-

ing, Catherine Ladnier spoke about how in 1943, the British troop ship, HMT Rohna, was hit by a new weapon of War. Thirteen sons of Mississippi (one of whom was from Pass Christian) died.

At the October luncheon, Jan Van Meervald and Carter Hillyer recounted the story of how Mr. Van Meerveld journeyed from the Netherlands to Pass Christian. The story is set out in the memoir "The Dutchman's Journey".
